Option A: The nineteenth century

- 1 Despite some early successes, the revolutions of 1848 largely failed.
 - (a) Describe events in Berlin in March 1848. [4]
 - (b) Why did some Italians rebel against Austrian rule in 1848–49? [6]
 - (c) ‘The 1848 revolutions failed because the revolutionaries were divided.’ How far do you agree with this statement? Explain your answer. [10]

- 2 Prussia grew in importance in Germany in the mid-nineteenth century.
 - (a) What was the Zollverein? [4]
 - (b) Why was the Frankfurt Parliament set up in 1848? [6]
 - (c) ‘It was Austrian errors that allowed Prussia to take the lead in seeking German unification.’ How far do you agree with this statement? Explain your answer. [10]

- 3 There were many struggles against imperialism towards the end of the nineteenth century.
 - (a) Describe the Cuban struggle for independence in the 1890s. [4]
 - (b) Why did the Philippine Revolution break out in 1896? [6]
 - (c) ‘The United States’ actions in Cuba and the Philippines in the 1890s show that it was against imperialism.’ How far do you agree with this statement? Explain your answer. [10]

- 4 Rivalries and tensions grew in Europe in the decades before 1914.
 - (a) What was the Dual Alliance (1894)? [4]
 - (b) Why did Austria respond aggressively to the assassination of Archduke Franz Ferdinand? [6]
 - (c) ‘In the period 1890 to 1914, colonial rivalries were more important than the arms race in increasing international tensions.’ How far do you agree with this statement? Explain your answer. [10]

Option B: The twentieth century

- 5** The League of Nations struggled to achieve its aims.
- (a) Describe how the Assembly of the League operated. [4]
- (b) Why was there a crisis over Manchuria in the early 1930s? [6]
- (c) 'The League was more effective in its humanitarian work than in dealing with international disputes.' How far do you agree with this statement? Explain your answer. [10]
- 6** Little was done in reaction to Germany's aggressive foreign policy in the 1930s.
- (a) Describe the events leading up to Anschluss in 1938. [4]
- (b) Why did Germany become involved in the Spanish Civil War? [6]
- (c) Which was more important: the remilitarisation of the Rhineland or the Munich Agreement? Explain your answer. [10]
- 7** From 1945, tensions between the Soviet Union and the West grew quickly.
- (a) Describe events in Greece between 1945 and 1950. [4]
- (b) Why was the Soviet Union suspicious of the Marshall Plan? [6]
- (c) How close did the Soviet Union and the West come to war during the Berlin Crisis of 1948–49? Explain your answer. [10]
- 8** During the 1960s, the United States struggled to contain communism in different parts of the world.
- (a) Describe the tactics used by the Viet Cong. [4]
- (b) Why did Nixon introduce Vietnamisation in 1969? [6]
- (c) How close did the United States and the Soviet Union come to war over Cuba in 1962? Explain your answer. [10]

Section B: Depth studies

Depth study A: The First World War, 1914–18

- 9** After German troops entered France in 1914, heavy fighting took place.
- (a) Describe the German advance through Belgium in 1914. [4]
 - (b) Why was the Battle of Verdun important? [6]
 - (c) 'The criticisms of the leadership and tactics of General Haig in the Battle of the Somme have been unfair.' How far do you agree with this statement? Explain your answer. [10]
- 10** Much happened in the last two years of the war.
- (a) Describe the American entry into the war in 1917. [4]
 - (b) Why did the Kaiser abdicate in 1918? [6]
 - (c) How far was the American entry into the war the decisive military factor in bringing about the Allied victory? Explain your answer. [10]

Depth study B: Germany, 1918–45

- 11** The Nazis used legal and illegal methods in their struggle for power.
- (a) What was the 25 Point Programme of 1920? [4]
 - (b) Why did the Nazis do well in the Reichstag election of March 1933? [6]
 - (c) 'Hitler carried out the Night of the Long Knives to win the support of the German army.' How far do you agree with this statement? Explain your answer. [10]
- 12** By the mid-1930s, the Nazis were firmly in power in Germany.
- (a) Describe the changes in economic policy brought in by the Four Year Plan. [4]
 - (b) Why did Hitler want to rearm Germany? [6]
 - (c) 'The Nazis maintained their control of Germany by the use of fear and violence.' How far do you agree with this statement? Explain your answer. [10]

Depth study C: Russia, 1905–41

- 13** In the early part of the twentieth century, the Tsar's position gradually worsened.
- (a) What was the October Manifesto? [4]
 - (b) Why was the war with Japan important for Russia? [6]
 - (c) 'The March Revolution of 1917 took place because people had lost faith in the Tsar.' How far do you agree with this statement? Explain your answer. [10]
- 14** Stalin was ruthless in maintaining his power.
- (a) What happened at the show trials? [4]
 - (b) Why did Stalin emerge as leader of the Soviet Union by 1928? [6]
 - (c) Was it propaganda or the Purges that kept Stalin in power? Explain your answer. [10]

Depth study D: The United States, 1919–41

- 15** Some US industries struggled in the 1920s, while others prospered.
- (a) Describe what happened to the coal industry in the 1920s. [4]
 - (b) Why was the use of credit important for the boom of the 1920s? [6]
 - (c) 'The main reason why American farming struggled in the 1920s was competition from other countries.' How far do you agree with this statement? Explain your answer. [10]
- 16** There were disagreements about how successful the New Deal was.
- (a) What was the National Recovery Administration? [4]
 - (b) Why did the business community oppose the New Deal? [6]
 - (c) How far was the New Deal a success in dealing with unemployment? Explain your answer. [10]

Depth study E: The Second World War in Europe and the Asia–Pacific, 1939–c.1945

(a) What were the immediate consequences of the attack on Pearl Harbor? [4]

(b) Why did the Americans win the Battle of Midway? [6]

(a) Describe the Battle of Guadalcanal. [4]

(b) Why did the Allies occupy Germany at the end of the war? [6]

(c) 'The Allied advance through Italy was essential in the defeat of Germany.' How far do you agree with this statement? Explain your answer. [10]

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
