- 1 Figure 1.1 shows part of the drainage basin system.
- (a) Using Figure 1.1:
- (i) state flow A [1]
 - (ii) name **one** output from the drainage basin system. [1]
- (b) Using Figure 1.1, explain **two** types of water flow below the ground. [4]
- (c) Explain why the rate of overland flow in a drainage basin may change over time. [4]

Atmosphere and weather

- 2 Figure 2.1 shows selected impacts of global warming in Africa.
- (a) Describe the pattern of impacts of global warming in Africa shown in Figure 2.1. [3]
- (b) Suggest reasons for the impacts of global warming shown in Figure 2.1. [3]
- (c) Explain how **two** types of evidence indicate global warming. [4]

Rocks and weathering

- 3 Figure 3.1 shows the velocity of some mass movements.
- (a) Using Figure 3.1:
- (i) state the name of the mass movement that has a velocity of 1 mm/day [1]
 - (ii) state the maximum velocity of mud and debris flows. [1]
- (b) Contrast the rate of the mass movement of creep and solifluction. Use information from Figure 3.1. [3]
- (c) Explain the role of water in mass movement. [5]

Section B

Answer **one** question from this section. All questions are worth 30 marks.

- 4 (a) (i) Define the fluvial terms 'hydraulic action' and 'helical flow'. [4]
- (ii) Briefly explain how the shape of a storm hydrograph is affected by the drainage density of a drainage basin. [3]
- (b) Explain how hard engineering could prevent river flooding. [8]
- (c) 'The impact of the flood was greater on people than on the environment.'
- With the aid of a case study of a recent river flood event, how far do you agree with this statement? [15]

Atmosphere and weather

- 5 (a) (i) Define the atmospheric terms 'sensible heat transfer' and 'albedo'. [4]
- (ii) Describe the urban heat island effect. [3]
- (b) Explain the different types of precipitation. [8]
- (c) 'The greatest influence on the seasonal variation of temperature is the land/sea distribution.'
- With the aid of examples, how far do you agree with this statement? [15]

Rocks and weathering

- 6 (a) (i) Describe how afforestation may reduce mass movement. [3]
- (ii) Explain **two** small-scale movements of sediment on slopes. [4]
- (b) Explain the processes **and** landforms that occur at divergent (constructive) plate boundaries. [8]
- (c) With the aid of examples, assess the extent to which rock type is more significant than climate in affecting the type of weathering in an area. [15]

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
